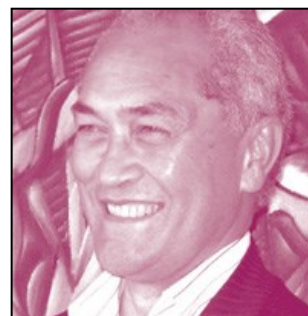

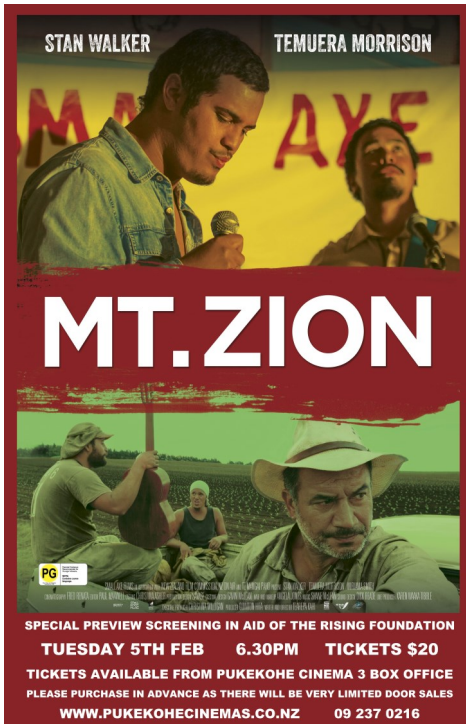

Relay For Life

Franklin Saturday 9th & Sunday 10th March



Relay For Life is one of the Cancer Society's biggest community activities. Over 20,000 New Zealanders in 21 communities helped celebrate, remember and fight back this summer! Often described as a life changing experience, Relay is a chance to celebrate cancer survivors, remember loved ones lost to cancer and fight back against a disease that affects one in three New Zealanders.

One of the motivations was the knowledge that our Board Chair John Bongard and Little Zachary Tulafono are both survivors of cancer but also others within TRF had families and friends impacted by the terrible disease and still on their journey. So TRF team organised Papakura High School and Pukekohe High School students together for the weekend to participate in Franklin's 2013 Relay For Life at the A & P Showground's. We were known as the "orange team" as our theme was to show people to be cautious and on alert in all that we do. Preventative is better than intervention by far so as we stood out and people noticed who and what The Rising Foundation stood for. 60 participating student's (past and present) with parents, caregivers, siblings and friends joined us throughout the day and night. Once camp was set up, we were ready to start the pounding of feet. Participants walk all through the night with at least one member on the track at all times. This represents the fact that cancer never sleeps.

Acknowledgment and a huge thank you to Neil & Vanessa Roach for supplying and donating all our gear to kit us out. Also to all those who donated food, drinks and supplied dinner for the orange team. We can all give ourselves a huge pat on the back as we walked over 1,800 laps and raised \$800 for the Cancer Society.

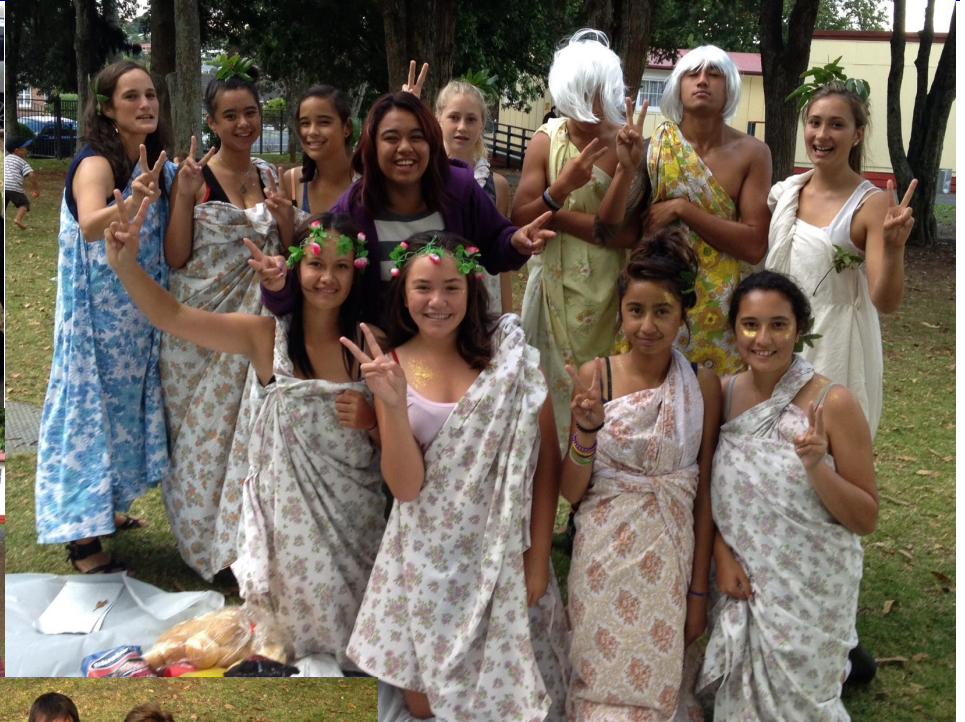

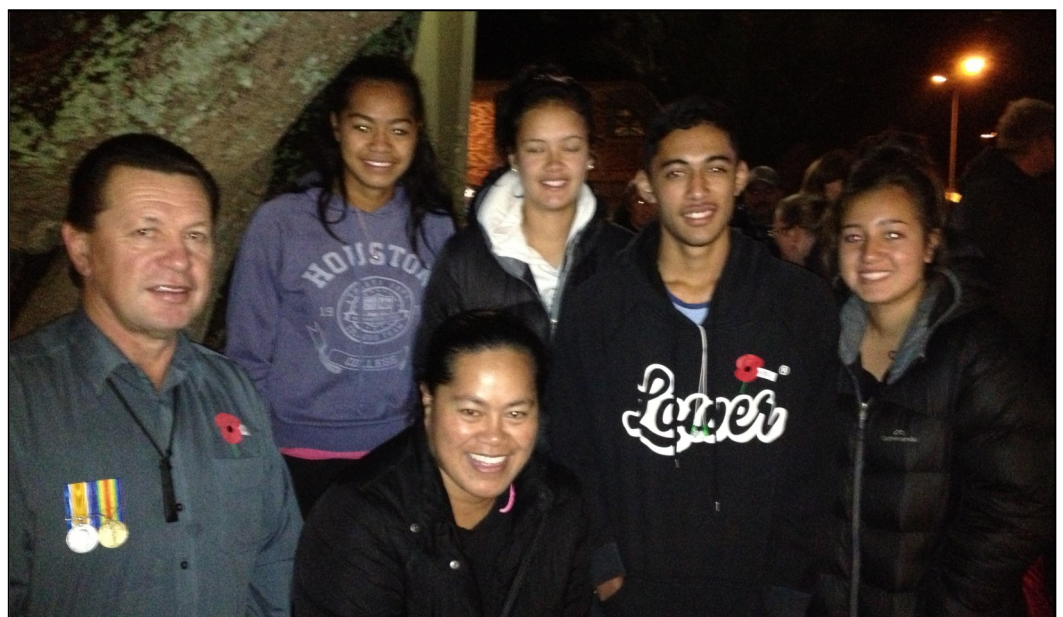

Capture of ones journey with The Rising Foundation

Papakura High School

I became a member of The Rising Foundation at fourteen years old; at this age I was very vulnerable to the influences around me. I enjoyed academic and sporting challenges but I lacked a sense of purpose. When I was first introduced to the group I was immersed into a group of students from the ages of 13-18 years of age. In this team we competed against the other three teams to gain points to win The Rising Foundation trophy. Although this group had a lot of fun competing against each other, this wasn't the main focus of the group; we also learned a lot of valuable principles that had the potential to change our lives. Throughout our journey we were exposed to many challenges within our groups. These challenges helped me consider my own strengths and weaknesses.

The concept of the group represented a seed, in my eyes we are all seeds. Naturally seedlings will sprout and grow into a beautiful, strong tree and eventually that tree will bear fruit and produce a resource for the people surrounding them, this to me is a process that helped me understand the growing up and transitioning into adulthood. As a team leader I seen movement of staff (volunteers) from all levels, and recently found myself with the view that when people would ask to help, my first response would be; "what can you offer our organisation?" & "how can it benefit our foundation"? Looking back over the years and the growth of our foundation, I can almost see how this thinking crept into my own practice. Students Achievements

Pukekohe High School

- 2012 NCEA Level 1 Pukekohe High School Maori/Polynesian students pass rate went from 45% to 66%. This improved statistic was heavily influenced by The Rising Foundation programme being active at the school, as stated by Pukekohe High School Principal Ian McKinnon.
- Eight out of twelve Rising Foundation students in senior school were selected as Prefects this year with two as Head Girls.

Papakura High School

- Eight senior students from The Rising Foundation were selected as Prefects, with two as Head Girls.
- Four of The Rising Foundation graduates have been privately sponsored to attain Social Worker degrees and will come back to the programme as trainers.

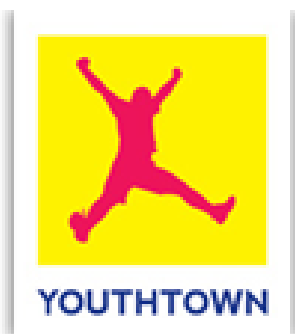
