# TRAISIT 2011 A FOND FAREWELL TO 2022

Over the last three years we have built a valuable relationship with Julia Arnott-Nene. First through PeopleforPeople and now through her new venture FIBRE FALE, a Pasifika tech advocacy network which she launched this year with her business partner and tech powerhouse, Eteroa Lafaele.



We love their energy and passion for promoting the many opportunities the tech industry has to offer and we especially love their wholehearted commitment to helping young Pasifika students see a future for themselves in web development, digital design, coding or any one of the host of possible careers that FIBRE FALE promotes.

As more than half of our TRF cohort come from Pasifika points of origin, we see our relationship with Fibre Fale as an important boost to our promotion of the S.T.E.A.M (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathmatics) subjects that we want more of our young people to get into, because Maori and Pasifika are under represented in these vital areas of work in New Zealand.

In late October, Fibre Fale organised our third installment of our annual Vaka experience, this time we were invited to the Vodafone Head Office in Takapuna to get some exposure to the wide world of technology. This event had been a plan 'in the works' for a while now.

Our students had a blast! Their perspectives were broadened beyond the scope of the stereotypes of the technology world and it definitely gave them some clear insight into what their future careers in this sector could look like.

Our hosts, Vodafone and the Palo Alto Network provided students with a keynote speaker panel and four workshops including an amazing tour of the building. We were even invited into spaces their own employees do not have access to. Thank you to the team at Palo Alto, Vodafone and our friends at Fibre Fale for continuing to give our students these great workplace exposure opportunities.



Following the Vaka experience there was a Fibre Fale Fono held at the Blue Light Youth Centre where a selection of guest speakers were invited to share their insights on a panel about their journeys into the tech space.

Each panelist was open and honest about the struggles and rewards or being a person of Pacific Island origin in a predominantly pakeha/palagi arena. Each had suffered from the prejudice and ignorance of their peers in these environments but each had overcome these challenges with courage.

Our students tend to gravitate towards the nuggets of wisdom held within the personal stories and journeys of our guest speakers, so it was cool to see everyone engaged and asking questions.

# **TRANSITION CAMP 2022**

If you've been in a position where you've transitioned from Intermediate into High School, you may remember the sporadic nerves churning in your stomach as you searched the sea of people for a familiar face.

You may remember the undercurrent of panic at the thought of being lost in unfamiliar territory or the grating sense of uncertainty as you stood in the assembly.

Transition Camps have been held over the years with the purpose of easing that transition between Intermediate and High School as well as introducing Year 8 students to The Rising Foundation Programme.



The essence of these camps is to create close relationships of trust between the High School students and the Year 8's providing a network of people for them to turn to on their first day, should they get lost or need guidance.



It also creates the foundation of a peer mentoring relationship that falls under the tuakana teina model. This year we have extended this process beyond just a transition camp and started interacting with the Intermediates a bit earlier.

We went into the Intermediates for the first two sessions so that we can get to know them and vice versa.

The third school session was hosted at Rosehill College with our high school cohort, followed by a parent information evening. It's a positive experience for us to interact with the students and their families as soon as possible so that they know who we are and what we do.

The transition camp itself was wicked! The Year 8's brought so much energy and life into the week that it made it that much more exciting. We always tell our students that the more they put in, the more they'll get out and that's what we saw!



The weather was a bit hit or miss, but believe me when I say we found entertainment regardless.



Our two major activities for the week were surfing and rock climbing which both presented their unique challenges. For a lot of people the ocean can be dangerous, so it's cool to have an activity which equips the kids with basic knowledge of how to navigate the ocean. (See below!)

Rock climbing is a classic way to challenge those who fear heights and despite many of them having that fear, they pushed through and participated anyway.


As coordinators we were inspired to see the Year 8's grow within their respective groups from awkwardly shy to confident and comfortable.



TRF is only as good as its people and we can't wait to see what our excellent team is going to do in 2023!




