Entity's Purpose or Mission:

The Rising Foundation is driven by the concept of "Unlocking Your Potential". More than a catch phrase, we endeavour to see this become a reality in the lives of every young person we work with. We have seen first-hand how our sustained programme of intervention and support achieves this goal. We partner with families, Intermediate and High Schools to unlock the potential of referred adolescents who display leadership qualities despite coping with challenging personal circumstances.

We provide a five to seven year programme packed with insights, values and principles, emotional and moral support, role models and opportunities to practice what they have learned through challenging and creative activities that would otherwise be out of their reach.

We ease their transition from Intermediate to High school and the transition from High school to Tertiary education or the workforce. We help our youth to 'Rise Up' to be their 'best selves' ready to face their future as confident and responsible members of the community.

- We identify and nurture young leaders over a 5-7 year period. - We address issues such as confidence, integration, truancy, bullying, substance abuse and underage pregnancy. - We introduce values and principles to promote good decision making, honesty, responsibility, enthusiasm, vision and employability.

Entity Structure:

Our Trust Deed states that we must have between five and seven trustees.

We currently have seven trustees that constitute our Governance Board, including one Chair and Board Trustees plus a Treasurer and a Secretary. We have a total of seven paid employees: Our Administration Team (General Manager and Programme Administrator) and five School Programme Coordinators.

Volunteers support our multi-school events and include Programme Graduates and Parents.

Within our schools we oversee a Student Peer Support Structure with Seniors walking alongside Juniors.

Main Sources of the Entity's Cash and Resources:

The Rising Foundation Trust receives donations both from private and corporate funders, secondary schools and non-Government grants.

Main Methods Used by the Entity to Raise Funds:

Fundraising activities include an Annual Race Day, Trillian Trust FunFest and regular small fundraising events in schools.

Entity's Reliance on Volunteers and Donated Goods or Services:

As we have just five Programme Coordinators and our student numbers run at 250 level, we depend on volunteer help to maintain student / adult ratios for multi-school events. Our volunteers are either graduates of the programme who come back to lend a hand, or are parents of currently participating students.

Description of the Entity's Outcomes:

The Rising Foundation is driven by the concept of the "Unlocking Your Potential" of every young adult and has seen first-hand how a sustained programme of intervention and support works. We reinforce the notion that with positive changes in attitude and hard work, huge potentail can be unlocked and nurtured, even though some of our students are facing very challenging personal circumstances. Our break-through programme supports adolescents to RISE UP and to build positive lives. While the programme begins in schools, post schooling work continues to provide employment opportunities for our graduates with motivated companies and business leaders within the community. We have a current population of 254 predominantly Maori and Polynesian (with some Indian, Asian and European) students across fivr South Auckland schools. We now have a team of seven full time workers, five of whom are Programme Graduates. Over 1,428 students have been through our programme. Students who join The Rising Foundation stay in school, attend consistently and regularly attain better academic results than the general school population. Our students gain insight and grow in confidence and maturity. We expect high standards of personal discipline, respect and behaviour. We encourage a caring and inclusive culture in our group and team meetings and on our regular camps and excursions. We are driven by the simple wish to help children, who wouldn't otherwise have the opportunities they deserve, to get what they need to rise above their beginnings and thrive in life. That's what keeps us going. We measure attendance, NCEA results and behaviour versus rest of school. By teaching our students the value of education, hard work, self-sacrifice, leadership and giving back to the community, The Rising Foundation will help raise the standards of living of their families, friends and communities as well as become leaders in New Zealand. The nurturing of future leaders for our community is an expected outcome and we achieve this by reinforcing the importance of family and community in this journey. We also reinforce the importance of continuing education and employment. We succeed in this outcome by assisting as many of our students as possible into higher education and job training. We have a partnership with Skills Org NZ to work with them to enable on the job training for our students in a wide range of industries. A visit to our Facebook page. Therisingfoundation NZ shows numerous examples of student positive feedback and photographs of various functions/camps.

Description and Quantification (to the extent practicable) of the Entity's Outputs:

During 2017/18 we had an average 254 students on our programme. Details of our 2017 outcomes are as follows:

- The programme runs in six South Auckland schools Papakura High, Rosehill College, Pukekohe High, Sir Edmund Hillary Collegiate, Manurewa High and Pukekohe Int
- The Rising Foundation ethnicity breakdown as at December 2017 was Pacific Island 59%, NZ Maori 30%, European 10%, Asian 1%
- 2017 saw 17 students graduate from Year 13. Of these students:
- 2 are at University
- 3 are at other Tertiary Institutes
- 8 are in full time employment
- 3 are in Part time employment
- 1 in full time training
- NCEA results at all schools exceeded rest of school results. The Rising Foundation students across our five secondary schools achieved 82% pass rate for all students and 95% pass rate for core students (excluding referrals) versus school average across all schools of 66%.
- Attendance levels at schools exhibited the same positive outcomes with attendance levels at all schools overall exceeding rest of school results.
- Across all schools attendance showed an overall improvement from 1% to 26%.
- · Behavioural stats show very low to non-existent levels of stand-downs versus whole of school
- 89% of our students have gained confidence because of being part of TRF
- 88% of our students have gained leadership skills because of being part of TRF
- 93% of our students have gained self respect because of being part of TRF
- 93% of our students have gained determination because of being a part of TRF
- 89% of our students have gained purpose because of being part of TRF

"Today I am in my third year of studies at Carey Baptist College studying a Bachelor in Applied Theology. I'm eternally grateful for the countless opportunities given and still available for me and all the other students past and present through The Rising. From my 'seedling' beginnings to now a 'growing tree' I can only continue to give thanks to The Rising Foundation for their role in my journey. I attribute so much of the strength of my vision and desire for myself and my community to The Rising Foundation's vision: Unlocking Your Potential, they unlocked mine!"

Sample student comments regarding the effectiveness of our programme are as follows:

Year 11 Student Transition Camp "During camp the student leaders were given the task to present PowerPoint topics that would give the students "gold nuggets" of information to help them through their High School lives. I saw the Year 8's starting to think more positively about High School. As the camp went on, I also saw a change in the Year 8's attitude. At the start their attitude towards meeting new people was poor, but by the end of the camp everyone had formed strong bonds with each other".

Students' reflections after camp "I learned how to show my true self and to apply the knowledge gained in my life"- Yr 11 Boy. "I recognised my own self worth, it's important to appreciate others and what you have already" - Yr 10 Girl.

"Camp was beneficial because it sort of let the 'real' out of me. I showed some feelings in our talks even though I had barely let my guard down before" - Yr 10 Boy. "This camp made me think a lot about the importance of family and how much they are needed, more than I think at times." - Yr 12 Girl. "...camp was life changing for me. I wanted to cry as soon as I saw my parents! The teachings in camp have opened more doors, and opportunities for me to grow into a better/wiser individual...you must make a choice to take a chance or your life will never change" - Yr 12 Girl. Community Impact WeekBarbara Carney from Manukau Beautification Charitable Trust said: "The young people were absolutely amazing. Their stamina, joviality, persistence and willingness to serve the community was absolutely outstanding. These young people will make great leaders".

Additional Information:

Programme Coordinators

All of our Programme Coordinators are ex TRF alumni. This assists the effectiveness of our programme as current students relate easier to coordinators that have previously come through the programme. As the coordinators grew up in the same neighbourhoods as our students they have an 'inside' knowledge of the world and the challenges that our students face. For the students there is a direct line from where they are now to where their Coordinator is in life and this acts as an encouragement and inspiration for them. If they did it, so can!!

SimTutor — In order to teach others how to present TSI's unique Storytelling Programme we are collaborating with Sim Tutor to produce interactive online training modules that make the wealth of moral, social and psychological content in the stories more accessible and relatable.

Therapeutic Storytelling Intervention

In collaboration with Ron Phillips of TSI we have integrated the excellent Gem Journey Preventative Therapeutic Storytelling Intervention into our programme at Year 9 and 10. This 16 week journey equips our students to find their best selves and absorb the central values and principals of our programme in an intuitive way.

Students acquire their own identity and shift to a healthier cognitive and emotional developmental path through interacting with this process. It brings another level of psychological depth and sophistication to our work.

Kiwi Harvest

Weekly deliveries of rescued food items from Kiwi Harvest is a true blessing to a number of our less fortunate families and we find that our close relationship with our students and our communities makes us an ideal conduit for this kind of giving which might be refused out of shame if offered from an outside agency.

Our partnership with Skills Org is vital to our strategy for transitioning our students out of the world of school and into the world of work – many of our students have already benefitted from the training opportunities and career directions that Skills Org have available.

Counties Manukau Sports

We have been delighted with the generosity and support of Counties Manukau Sport who have included us in their Break Away holiday activities and have sponsored students to take part in our adventure camps – we are very grateful for this new avenue of collaboration.

For the year ended 31 March 2018

Basis of Preparation

The Rising Foundation Trust is a Charitable Trust incorporated in New Zealand under the Charitable Trust Act 1957.

The Rising Foundation Trust has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future. All figures have been rounded to the nearest

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in Accounting Policies. All policies have been applied on a basis consistent with those used in previous vears.

Specific Accounting Policies

In Preparation of these financial statements, the specific accounting policies are as follows:

Property Plant and Equipment

The entity has the following classes of Property, Plant & Equipment;

Motor Vehicles

20 - 30% DV

Office Equipment

16 - 50% DV

Plant & equipment

40 - 50% DV

Temporary buildings

0% All property, plant and equipment is stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation has been calculated in accordance with rates permitted under the Income Tax Act 2007.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The Rising Foundation Trust is GST-registered. All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

The Rising Foundation Trust is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Finance Leases

Assets purchased under finance leases which effectively transfer to the lessee substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the property are included as non-current assets in the Balance Sheet. Finance Leases will be capitalised at the present value of the minimum lease payments. A corresponding liability is also disclosed with lease payments being apportioned between the liability and interest payments.

The depreciation policy for depreciable assets, that are the subject of a finance lease, will be consistent with that for assets that are owned, unless there is no certainty that the lessee will take ownership by the end of the lease term, in which case the assets will be depreciated over the shorter of the estimated useful life of the asset or the lease term.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at their estimated realisable value after providing against debts where collection is doubtful. Bad debts are written off in the year in which they are identified.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

Recognition of Income

Income shown in the Statement of Financial Performance comprises amounts received and receivable by the Trust.

Donation, fundraising and camp income is recognised at the time that it is received.

Grants are recognised over the term of the grant. Any unspent grants with use or return conditions attached to the grant are treated as a payable and shown on the Statement of Financial Position until the conditions are satisfied.

Interest income is recognised using the effective interest method.

Opinion

We have audited the performance report of The Rising Foundation Trust (the Trust), which comprises:

- the entity information;

- the statement of financial performance for the year then ended;
- the statement of cash flows for the year then ended; and
- the statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance report.

In our opinion:
